Understanding Loose Parts Play and its Benefits for Early ...
There is a growing body of evidence (Hyndman, Benson, Ullah and Telford, 2014) of the benefits of playing with loose parts including: • Increasing levels of creative and imaginative play • Children play co-operatively and socialise more • Children are physically more active • Curriculum outcomes occur through informal play with loose parts (Wagland, 2015) • Loose parts facilitate communication and negotiation skills when added to an outdoor space (Maxwell, Mitchell and Evans, 2008).

Tree blocks, pinecones, small floor samples (tile, carpet, wood), coasters, and napkin rings make good small loose parts, and sand, water, and clay are natural loose parts. Fine-motor skills include control and accuracy of actions made with the small muscles of the hands.
