Initial critical responses to the novel were mixed. Many critics praised Lee for her sensitive treatment of a child’s awakening to racism and prejudice.

Also living in Monroeville, Alabama during this time was young Nelle Harper Lee, who would grow up to write To Kill a Mockingbird (1960).
